Jacques Plante was professional goalie in Canada and probably one of the most important innovators in hockey. Why? Realizing the

problems associated with being a goalie (namely, blazing pucks to the face!), Plante was the first player to wear a goalie mask on a regular basis during games. With experts and teammates, he developed and tested a variety of masks, finally

settling on a mask/helmet combination that provided safety and good vision. However, Plante was also one of the first goalies to play outside the crease area to support his defensemen and direct players behind the play. As a result, he was able to lead his team in several wins and later become inducted in the Hockey Hall of Fame. What lessons can you learn from the efforts of Jacques Plante? Despite the problems facing goalie at the time, Plante worked to develop effective solutions those problems, while supporting his teammates efforts! How did he go about this? What kind of problem solver was Jacques Plante?

Good problem solvers do the following:

- work with others to help solve problems collaboratively
- are not judgmental or stand in harm's way
- share their experiences on how they solved problems
- do not give advice or tell others what to do
- suggest options, identify consequences
- report anything like abuse or neglect to a teacher or adult in responsibility

Want to be a mediator?

You may have seen students escorting new members of our school to class on occasion or leading tours around our school. However, did you know that these students also help out to mediate disputes? These students are Peer Mediators and they work with the guidance counselor to problem solving, to offer ideas to solve problems and to encourage students to choose a more appropriate way to handle their conflicts. When your teacher makes a referral to the guidance center requesting a peer mediator, the guidance counselor determines whether or not a peer mediator is able to work with the students. If a peer mediator is needed, the mediator can work through issues alongside the guidance counselor. Being a peer mediator is a rewarding experience and gives you first-hand experience to apply your leadership skills.

What we do:

- receive training as a peer mediator
- work with students who experience conflicts resulting from teasing, threats, rumours, name-calling, property issues, arguing, friendships in a peaceful way
- assigned to new students to act as buddies to help them feel more comfortable at our school
- assist with character education assemblies and programs

What we don't do:

- give advice
- deal with issues surrounding weapons,
 drugs, sexual harassment, abuse
- keep things secret from guidance counselor, teachers etc.
- tell you what to do and where
- refrain from dealing with situations for which we don't have training or preparation
- take sides
